VILLAGE COUNCIL

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The Council met on Wednesday, June 8 in person at the Chevy Chase United Methodist Church library and via Zoom. The meeting began at 8:00 p.m. All Council members were present, with Carolyn Greis joining at approximately 8:20 p.m. The minutes of the May meeting, as presented in the June *News & Views* under Council Actions, were approved.

Buildings & Roads

The Village Manager reported that the initial Raymond Street stormwater plan, which was originally prepared to comply with comments by County officials, when drafted, County reviewers to be too difficult to execute. The County has therefore suggested a less complex plan that will not require reservoirs from stormwater runoff on neighbor's yards. The revised plan does not require that much of the sidewalk be dug up thus most of the work will be in the street. Our civil engineering firm, Clark Azar & Associates, is working on the revisions and will re-submit plans for review. Despite the less complex construction anticipated, it is expected that the price for the work will not change materially, given rising prices. At the same time, Clark Azar is working on a concept plan to be ready to discuss at the July Council meeting for the extension of the Georgia Street storm drain to capture water at Bradley and Brookville Road.

The Council decided that if possible, we'd like to be able to bid out the combined job and save some money on mobilization. The extension of the Georgia Street line has been surveyed and generally discussed with the County officials already.

Carolyn Greis reported that five building permits have been recently issued. The **Godofsky/Parvers** of 3611 Shepherd Street were issued a permit to construct a patio and a grill structure in their rear yard. Two permits were issued for the construction of fences: one to the **Fuher** family of 6808 Delaware Street for a fence in their rear yard, and the other to the **Woods** family of 3707 Bradley Lane for a fence in their front yards (on Bradley Lane and Georgia Street) and their rear yard. The **Clarke** family of 3711 Shepherd Street was issued a permit to locate two AC condenser units in their east side yard. The building permit previously issued to the **Grossfeld** family of 3701 Bradley Lane was amended to allow a change of material for their new driveway from the restored pea gravel to permeable pavers. The Council also took up the variance request by **Catherine Graham** of 7008 Brookville

Road to replace an existing non-conforming deck which will extend 4' into the 20' rear yard setback. The Council voted unanimously to grant the variance given the undue hardship of not being able to renovate or improve an existing structure located within a setback if the variance were not granted. Without the proposed renovation of the existing deck, there would be no second means of egress from Mrs. Graham's home, and the variance request was narrowly tailored to overcome this situation. The Council reported that it had reached out to the developers of the former 4-H property to arrange a time for an introductory meeting. During the June 8 meeting, there was discussion of the planned Corso Chevy Chase senior living facility, with the Council making clear that it wanted the developers to know of Section 3 concerns. Several residents joined the discussion to express concerns.

Subsequent to the June 8 meeting, the Village Manager, Council Treasurer Tom Carroll and Council Chair Susan Manning met with Community Three, a local developer that is spearheading the project with Atlanta-based Galerie Living. Section 3 representatives emphasized the important interests of Section 3 and its residents: certain areas of concern such as setbacks, massing along Connecticut Avenue, parking and traffic issues. All parties agreed on the importance of coordination and dialogue. The meeting went well and the developer now understands that the facing municipality will also be conveying our perspective on their proposed development.

Lighting Status: Two demonstration LED lights went up in Section 3 in early June: on Delaware Street by 6816
Delaware Street and at the intersection of Shepherd and Fulton Streets. Our initial assessment is that the demonstration lights are too bright and out of scale for our streets. Our lighting designer will assess the status and make recom-

mendations in late June. In the meantime, the Village Manager has been communicating with the manufacturer and it is working on potential solutions, including a smaller light with less glare and a dimmer for each of the current lights. The dimmers will be installed and set to the reduction in light based on recommendations of our lighting designer. The 8' bracket arm which allows the light to hover over the middle of the street was favorably reviewed, but much work needs to be done on arriving at a suitable lighting solution given the limited lighting types now available.

3706 SPRING STREET STATUS REPORT

As of this writing, both the County's and Section 3's stop work orders remain in effect. Both orders require that site safety and stabilization measures be completed and certified by a Maryland licensed geotechnical engineer, and neither order will be lifted until new architectural, structural and drainage plans have been approved for permit by both Montgomery County and Section 3. Section 3's stop work order also sets conditions for the repair of all damaged greenways by a landscape professional, for corrective measures addressing damage to adjoining properties as prescribed and certified by a geotechnical engineer and an arborist, and the return of the developer and all subcontractors to good standing in the State of Maryland including proper licensing and registration. Revised plans have been submitted to the county and are currently under review. Copies of these plans were provided to Section 3 for informational purposes, but no formal permit application has been submitted as the County has not yet issued a new permit. New plans are required before construction may continue because the level of the basement floor must be raised to accommodate the higher-than-expected water table level, and this change has a ripple effect on the architectural, structural and drainage plans that must also by necessity be revised. No other work beyond site stabilization measures may be undertaken at the site until both the County's and Section 3's stop work orders have been lifted. One positive development in the matter has been the property owner's agreement to reimburse the Sheckells/Dioguardi family for the expenses they have incurred due to their wet basement caused by the work done next door.

Election Day is Tuesday, July 19 from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.; our local voting location is Chevy Chase United Methodist Church.

You can register to vote the same day at early voting locations or on July 19th primary election day as long as you have a Maryland driver's license, an ID card, a learners permit or other proof of residency in Section 3.

At the same time, Pepco has before the Public Service Commission a revised tariff for streetlights. Council Vice Chair Larry Lanpher and the Village Manager are working with PSC staff and other municipal colleagues to submit comments to the Public Service Commission.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATIVE

The Building Permits Coordinator is being trained by Carolyn Greis and residents will soon be able to contact Gabriel Nathaniel for building permits at permitting@chevychasesection3.org. We will send out an email when that address is live. The Village Manager has reviewed applications for her part-time assistant and will be interviewing soon.

Both trash collection and landscape contracts will be put out for bid this month to begin work at the beginning of our fiscal year, July 1. The Council authorized Tom Carroll, Susan Manning and the Village Manager to review bids and enter into a trash contract, and authorized Carolyn Greis, the Village Manager, and Susan Manning to review bids and enter into an agreement for the landscape work.

COMMUNITY & SOCIAL

The Village Manager confirmed that Pepe's Food Truck would be coming on June 15 and the Ice Cream Man would be coming on the last day of school, June 17. The Council was consulted and it was decided that if we could get three residents to volunteer their yards for the wine tasting event, we would try and do that in July. The Welcome New Neighbors BBQ is slated for July 14 with a rain date of July 21.

WSSC WATER LINE REPLACEMENT & SUMMER VACATIONS

The pandemic has resulted in considerable delays in the WSSC water line replacement project in Section 3. Supply chain issues have further delayed what was first envisioned as a 2017 start to a 2022 start. And even after the start, we have had supply issues. The first phase, Windsor Lane (off Brookville Road to the north of Section 3) and the dead end of Georgia Street, is due to commence at the end of June and continue into early July. WSSC will next begin work on Brookville Road from Windsor Place south to about Cummings Lane.

Once that segment of the job is completed, WSSC will move on to various segments within Section 3 including Connecticut Avenue between Raymond and Shepherd Streets, all of Shepherd Street, Delaware Street between Shepherd Street and its dead end, Taylor Street between Connecticut Avenue and Fulton Street, the no outlet section of Florida Street, and the block of Georgia Street between Raymond Street and Bradley Lane.

We will have a better understanding of how quickly this work will proceed, but if you are planning on being away for an extended period of time and you live on one of the streets in the plan, we ask that you park in your driveway and not on the street, just in case construction comes to your block before your return.

LOOK SHARP—THE KNIVES ARE COMING OUT JULY 30

JUNE RAINSTORM CAUSES BROOKVILLE ROAD CLOSURE

One of the new variety heavy rain storms that seems to be plaguing the area resulted in a six hour closure of Brookville Road from Shepherd Street to just in front of LaFerme Restaurant on June 2. A large part of a tree at the corner of Taylor and Brookville Road fell onto wires, downing one in the street. The tree fell right in the middle of rush hour, around 5:00 p.m. and until Pepco could come and positively say that the wire in the street was or wasn't live, police blocked off the street.

Not until close to 11:00 p.m. did Pepco determine the wire was live and repaired it then police re-opened the street. Happily, we were able to get Mulheron Tree Experts there and they waited patiently for hours until Pepco officials came to give the all clear. They extracted a Volvo from under a limb. The car had been stopped at the intersection going southbound when the tree fell. Pleased to report that no one was hurt and the rest of the tree was removed.

In the middle of the entire crazy scene, cars stuck in the line tried to duck down Cummings Lane to get out (a no outlet street), others tried to cut through via Georgia Street where the WSSC waterline replacement sign obscured the no outlet sign—backing up at night in the rain must have been a nightmare at both locations!


At the same time a hook and ladder truck tried to leave thesc ene by driving up Shepherd Street from Brookville Road, honking its horn to get parked cars to move out of the way. No power was lost at LaFerme Restaurant or any of the homes or businesses in the vicinity.

On the one hand, Pepco helped us by keeping the power on, but hurt us by taking five hours to get to the scene to tell us it was a "hot" wire. The traffic backup that was severe enough to make it onto WTOP traffic alerts. The next day we had a pile of gravel that had washed down the street but otherwise you could not even tell there had been such a chaotic scene the night before.
