We are grateful to the Church for their generosity in allowing us to use their facility each month.



The Council met on Wednesday, November 8 in room 107 of the CCUMC. The meeting began at 7:50 p.m. with all Council members in attendance.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The Village Manager announced that a long-time resident was hit by a car while crossing in the crosswalk on Brookville Road on Tuesday evening, November 7 on her way to La Ferme to meet a friend for dinner. Despite the fact that the resident was wearing a red raincoat, the southbound driver failed to see her and hit her throwing her 10 feet. The driver, who was subsequently charged, stayed at the scene. The victim was transported to the hospital and treated for her injuries, which, while not insignificant, could have been much worse.

The Village Manager notified the community and also sent a note to the State Highway Administration urging them to move quickly to do the promised work to improve the intersection and the visibility of the that stop sign .

BUILDINGS & ROADS

Carolyn Greis, our Buildings and Roads representative on the Council, reported that three permits were issued for the construction of new fences: one to the **Pivirotto** family of 3711 Bradley Lane; one to **7104 Delaware LLC (Laurence Cafritz Builders)**; and one to the **Weller** family at their newly acquired property at 6705 Connecticut Avenue. The Weller family of 3821 Bradley Lane also received a building permit for the construction of their temporary ice rink (See *October News & Views* for related variance information.)

The Village Manager is still waiting for the State Highway Administration to finish design revisions for the intersection improvement at Brookville Road and Taylor Street to take care of the lake that forms at the end of Taylor Street each time it rains.

The Council decided to give residents greater opportunity to voice their opinions about the possibility of opting out of the new Short Term Rental legislation by excluding our municipality from Chapter 54 of the County Code. To date, all the responses have been in support of Section 3 opting out of that legislation and barring short term rentals (under 30 days) in our community. The Village Council will vote on excluding Section 3 from the County legislation that regulates transient lodging facilities at its next meeting.

The Village Manager detailed the disasterous water-shut-off by WSSC so that water could be supplied to the home being constructed

on Connecticut Avenue. In addition to disrupting the lives of more than 47 Section 3 residents (some of whom were not even notified of the shut-off), the agency forced the last-minute closing of the CCUMC preschool, disrupting the lives of the parents of the 130 students who attend, many of whom are Section 3 residents. As if that wasn't enough of a problem, they then did not properly repair the incision they made in Connecticut Avenue, causing a large number of people to get flat tires because of the pothole that was created. The Village Manager has a claim form to collect from WSSC for any tire repairs because of the now repaired pothole in the easternmost lane of Connecticut Avenue between Wednesday, November 1 and Sunday, November 5. WSSC promises to provide more notice, inconvenience far fewer people and think a little more clearly before they ever do anything like that again.

The Village Manager will speak with construction personnel at PEPCO regarding our proposed street lighting plan to better understand what technical specifications and lighting wattage are required on Connecticut Avenue as it is a State highway

The Council spent a good deal of time discussing the status of 3602 Taylor Street which the County has now condemned because it is unfit for human habitation and a visual blight on the surrounding neighborhood; the exterior of the structure lacks a waterproof covering; and the structure is deemed a public nuisance in its current condition. The owner has until December 1 to repair, remove or restore the structure. After that date, the County can serve the owner with a citation. The Council has decided that, based on discussions with the County, the best path to resolution is to meet with all the concerned parties at the County level prior to Thanksgiving so that once the aforementioned deadline has passed, we can move forward with a plan that will resolve the problem for the community. STATUS UPDATE

BROOKVILLE ROAD RETAINING ITS STATUS AS A "PRIMARY RESIDENTIAL ROADWAY" RATHER THAN A "MINOR ARTERIAL"

Montgomery County Planning Staff has removed the recommendation for a change from their list of 128 proposed roadway reclassifications after hearing from the community. The Planning Board, however, will not get those recommendations until December 21 so while it appears that we have a victory, it remains uncertain.

SHORT TERM RENTALS IN SECTION 3

The Council will vote at their December meeting on whether or not to adopt the Transient Housing Chapter of the Montgomery DECEMBER 2017 County Code which governs the licensing of short term rentals (30 days or under) in the County. If we adopt the Chapter, then short term rentals would be legal. If we exclude ourselves from that Chapter, then short term rentals in Section 3 would be illegal.

3602 TAYLORSTREET

The lender on the property has foreclosed on the borrower and the courthouse auction is slated for November 30. The property has been condemned by the County. Council members and the Village Manager will be meeting with County officials in early December to determine the best course of action as they will know who controls the property following the sale.

BROOKVILLE ROAD & TAYLOR STREET INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENT

State Highway Administration officials cite delays in designing the roadway improvements necessary to fix the lake that now forms at the end of Taylor Street every time it rains as the reason why work on the project won't begin until early spring. We have asked whether any additional funding is required so that doesn't hold us up either and have yet to hear back from them. Needless to say, in light of the recent accident at that intersection, we are extremely disappointed in this additional delay. In the interim, police contracted by both Section 3 and Martin's Additions continue to ticket those who do not observe the stop signs at that intersection. Thanks to all who wrote comments online and letters to the Planning Board.

FIRE SAFETY LAWS: PAY ATTENTION!

Everyone should know . . .

1. Maryland's new smoke alarm law requires the replacement of all BATTERY-ONLY operated smoke alarms with units powered by sealed-in, 10-year long-life batteries.

2. All smoke alarms have expiration dates. Both hardwired and battery-operated smoke alarms need to be replaced every 10 years. If your smoke alarm hasn't been replaced since 2006, it's time!

3. Location, location, location: smoke alarms are required to be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home including basements (finished or unfinished).

4. For homes constructed since 1994, smoke alarms have been required inside all sleeping rooms. For maximum protection, fire officials recommend installing smoke alarms in sleeping rooms regardless of the year of construction.

5. Homeowners have until January 1, 2018 to comply with the new law. Any resident requiring information or assistance can call 311.

HOLIDAY SHOPPING SAFETY TIPS

This holiday season, don't let the spirit of giving lull you into giving burglars, robbers, thieves and pickpockets a better chance to do their dirty work. Criminals love the holidays just as much as everyone else, but mostly because it's an opportune time for crime!

Homes jam-packed with glittering gifts, stores, malls and streets filled with unsuspecting shoppers. People rushing around, stressed out and careless, looking for gifts, trying to get everything done. It's enough to make a criminal giddy with holiday joy.

Here are some tips on how to celebrate safely this holiday season from Community Services Officer Dana Stroman:

If You're traveling...

• Get an automatic timer for your lights.

• Ask a trusted neighbor to watch your home, shovel snow, and park in your driveway from time to time.

- Don't forget to have mail and newspaper delivery
- stopped. If it piles up, it's a sure sign you're gone.
 - Use your alarm system
 - Install cameras around home or door bell

IF YOU'RE OUT FOR THE EVENING

• Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone is home.

• Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes.

• Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside (near windows).

IF YOU'RE SHOPPING

• Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.

• Park in a well lighted space, and be sure to lock your vehicle, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.

• Avoid carrying large amounts of cash; pay with a check or credit card whenever possible.

• Deter pickpockets and purse-snatchers. Don't overburden yourself with packages. Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps or on your back. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.

• Shopping with kids? Teach them to go to a store clerk or security guard if you get separated.

• Carry cell phone in a case clipped on your belt or waist area, not in a purse.

SNOW SHOVELING FOR SENIORS

When there is a heavy snow (more than two inches) Section 3 will have our

snow removal contractors shovel the public sidewalk in front of your home if you are 65 or older. If you are already on our list, you don't have to sign up again. If you have not yet signed up and would like that service, just let the Village Manager know. We do not do private sidewalks leading from the street to the house or driveways, but you can contact the Village Manager who will try and connect you with a teenager eager to earn some extra money in Section 3. If you are a teenager who would like to earn some extra funds, let the village manager know as she keeps a list for interested parties. Parents are free to volunteer their children!

Seniors should know that this service is done AFTER roads have been cleared and does not absolve the resident from responsibility for ice or clearing the sidewalk if it's less than two inches. We just want to help you with the heavy lifting!

TIP DAY FOR TRASH COLLECTORS: DECEMBER 21

We are fortunate that two men handle ALL our trash collection and recycling...on Mondays they come once for household trash and once for yard waste, on the first Wednesday of the month they come once for regular bulk trash and then come back for metals which must be collected separately. On Thursdays, they come three times: once for household trash collection and once for paper recycling and then again for bottles and cans.

If you are not home and/or awake when they arrive at your home, on this day, you can either tape a note to the inside lid of your trash cans asking them to come to your door if you want to give them a tip, or failing that, tape an envelope with a tip to Nelson and Raul. We will alert them as to the day so that they will be sure to check.

Unless you've had a package stolen from your doorstep, you probably don't give much thought to where it is being delivered. But maybe you should. Montgomery County Police are alerting people about package theft by criminals who snatch packages from your doorsteps.

Fortunately, there are some steps from Community Services Officer Dana Stroman of the Montgomery County Police you can take to make sure your packages stay out of the grasp of criminals.

U.S. POSTAL SERVICE You can authorize the USPS to have certain deliveries left at a back or side door, on the porch, in the garage, or with a neighbor (to do so, you'll first need to create an account at USPS.com and enter the package tracking number to see whether it's eligible). Deliveries can also be held for pickup at a post office or be delivered to a GoPost location. Gopost is a new, convenient way to receive and ship packages. They're automated, secured, self-service parcel lockers placed near certain post offices, grocery stores, pharmacies, shopping centers.

FEDEX AND UPS With FedEx Delivery Manager, you can customize delivery times and addresses, have your packages held at a FedEx location, sign for your delivery in advance, and provide specific delivery location instructions. You can sign up for free but FedEx charges a fee for certain services, such as scheduling a delivery. UPS offers a service called My Choice (the basic program is free) that gives you advance notice of delivery times and allows you to reroute packages to another address or reschedule deliveries for a future date. You can also activate a vacation setting to have packages held and delivered when you return home. UPS has a service, Access Point, that allows you to drop off and pick up packages at designated neighborhood businesses.

AMAZON Amazon.com offers Amazon Locker—a self service kiosk located in shopping centers, retail stores, and elsewhere. Once you select an Amazon Locker, you receive a pick up code when the package is delivered. You can then collect your package up to three business days. After that, it will be returned to Amazon.

IF A STRANGER COMES TO THE DOOR, BEWARE... Criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts or home repair workers. And it's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of other's generosity during the holidays by going door to door for charitable donations when there's no charity involved. Or offering to do repairs around your residence. DO NOT OPEN YOUR DOOR FOR STRANGERS, speak through the door! If you want to make a donation to a charity, please contact the charity of your choice. If you need repairs done, contact a reputable company. If they act suspicious, call POLICE immediately. (301) 279-8000 Police Non-emergency
