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MAY ANNUAL MEETING & ELECTIONS

If you haven't submitted the stories about your home, it's not too late, we're continuing our search to collect as much information as possible to better understand how rich our history is. **Samples of the finished product and photographs of your house will be at the annual meeting,**May 8. Take a moment to vote and join us in the Eppworth Room which is located at the foot of the stairs near the Shepherd Street entrance to the Chevy Chase United Methodist Church. We'll also have a map with our best understanding at this time, of when each home was built according to our records and the state assessment records.

What happens at the Annual Meeting? The budget is reviewed and approved for the following fiscal year, the year's activities are summarized by each of the Council members and any pressing issues in the community are discussed. Catering by La Ferme, outdoor dining, a harpist, and even a birthday cake to the community, made this event a stunning success. Lots of Section 3 faces were in evidence at the event and a great time was had by all.

The Council met on Wednesday evening, April 11. All Council members except **Paul Kiernan** were present.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The Council is considering putting out a bid package to hire a firm to operate speed cameras on Connecticut Avenue and Brookville Road. Apropos of that interest, the Council talked with **David Mostofi** of Optotraffic about their system of speed monitoring which allows all three lanes of traffic to be monitored and ultimately ticketed. The firm has done a test on Brookville Road and discussed with the Council the possibility of doing a test on Connecticut Avenue. The Village Manager is going to do additional research on other vendors and help the Council develop a bid package for these services. In the interim, Optotraffic has agreed to do a free test set-up on Connecticut Avenue to determine the volume of speeders closer to the area near Chevy Chase United Methodist Church.

Chevy Chase Village is going to be using the contractor who was selected by Montgomery County, however that service only monitors a single lane at a time.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Council discussed the proposed budget including the fact that there was a possibility that the County's contribution to our operating budget under the heading of tax duplication might be lowered. (Note: The County Council has subsequently lowered the figure from that proposed by the County Executive).

The Council also discussed the fact that contracts for both Waste Collection and Landscaping were up for renewal. The Village Manager is working on the bid packages which will go out in early May so that the Council can make a decision at the June meeting for work to begin on July 1, the beginning of our fiscal year. Each bid package will be for a period of three years with an option to renew for a fourth year.

BUILDINGS AND ROADS

Bill Brownlee reported that he was to review the patio planned by the **Corbetts** of Shepherd Street to be certain that all runoff did not adversely affect the neighbors.

It appears that the Nigerian Ambassador's residence is under contract to a private owner/occupant. As soon as more information is known, News and Views will report.

The Council discussed the efforts by the **Lanter/Brindley** family to move some trees in hopes that such an effort would satis-

fy those who had objected to their location due to visibility problems. It was determined that there is still a number of people who find the remaining trees an obstruction and a letter would be sent to the family asking them to move all the trees. Mr. Brownlee agreed to discuss alternatives with the Lanter/Brindleys and ask them to submit a new variance request by the next Council meeting.

The Council agreed with the Village Manager that Verizon's desire to bring in new lines to serve DSL, cable and telephone service should be contingent upon their agreement to take care to protect our trees, sidewalks and roadways. Special arrangements will have to be made with Verizon to climit any of damage to public and private property.

COMMUNITY & SOCIAL

The Easter Egg Hunt was discussed and some suggestions were made for next year's event. The Council noted with thanks all the work done by **Evelyn Gerson** and **Kelly Virbikas** to make the event a success. Kudos to Mindy's Catering for not only preparing great food but having a wonderful staff person to assist us. Thanks to all those who helped with the set-up and take down of the tables, chairs, etc., and to the **Barrys** for the loan of their front lawn for the tent.

The House Stories project is growing with each passing day. Much more research needs to be done but it's hoped that a few sample completed house stories will be on hand for the Annual Meeting along with other information on the settlement of Section 3 and the wonderful people in it.

Work is progressing on possible locations for the May House Tour.

VARIANCE APPLICATION

The **Lanter/Brindley** family of Connecticut Avenue has submitted a variance to place a line of trees one foot inside their fence facing Connecticut Avenue. The variance will be taken up at the Annual Meeting.

gency calls and serve as a volunteer at least one night a week as an emergency medical technician, paramedic, firefighter or administrative help.



Administrative members help with dispatching apparatus, fundraising, public relations and other important tasks which don't require a physical exam.


