ANNUAL HOUSE TOUR MAY 20

We've been busy building and renovating in Section 3 and have a wonderful selection of homes for you to see on Sunday, May 20 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. The only charge for this annual event is your donations of shampoos, soaps and lotions and gently used towels which we give to the nonprofit for the homeless in Silver Spring, Shepherds' Table. They have showers for the homeless, so those little travel soaps come in handy for a one-time use. There will be bins at every home so that you can drop your donation at the first home you visit. We'll collect them and sort them and bring them to Shepherd's Table.

A brochure with the exact locations and detailed descriptions will be mailed to all residents closer to the event. Tours are the first floor only and will include the **Shuchart/Sebeok** home, the **Benhards**, the **Mannings**, the **Howard** home and **Tom and Katherine Carroll**'s home. The Council met on Wednesday, April 11 in the library at CCUMC. The meeting commenced at 7:50 p.m. All Council members were present.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The Village Manager updated the Council on the latest State Highway Administration delays in upgrading the safety of the intersection at Brookville Road and Taylor Street. Apparently the contract for construction at that site has lapsed and the contractor is refusing to do any additional work at the same unit pricing. She will continue to work with SHA and Martins Additions to get the job done.

Buildings & Roads

Council representative in charge of Buildings and Roads, Carolyn Greis, reported that a permit has been issued to the **Eaton/Ohrenstein** family of 3611 Spring Street for a two-story addition, porch, deck and patio, and that the **Dodson** family of 3625 Raymond Street has received a permit for a dumpster.

Montgomery County's court case against Taylor Rd. LLC (3602 Taylor Street) took place on March 27 in District Court in Rockville. The County has condemned the structure and demanded that the LLC owner, Saul Golan, remove, repair or demolish the structure. The maximum fine for failure to comply is \$500. Mr. Golan did not come to court; the fine was levied in absentia. The Council is working on some strategies to try and speed up the schedule and get the house demolished.

The Council decided to revisit the proposed changes to our ordinances and issue them in June in summary form in the newsletter with a full copy in context available on our website so as not to take up too much space in the newsletter.

The County Council is still weighing how to best handle small cell tower legislation. The State Legislature tabled its discussion of the issue when the delegate sponsoring the bill in favor of placement withdrew his bill because it was so controversial. Section 3 is opposed to the County proposed change as it would give us little say in the placement of small cells so close to our homes in the greenway which is already populated by trees, telephone poles and street signs.

The Village Manager reported new No Parking signs have gone up and the curbs have all been painted yellow to indicate no parking zones. Some streets will have cracks sealed later this spring to prevent damage to the asphalt layer from going to the street's foundation or base.

The Village Manager also indicated that ruts in the greenway would soon be addressed.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Three CDs come due in the month of April reported the Village Manager. One has already been rolled over at a better rate and she hopes to do so with the other two later in the month.

The Council agreed to pay for the specialized mulch for the CCUMC pre-school as a way of thanking the preschool and church for allowing us to hold so many meetings and events at their facility without charge.

COMMUNITY & SOCIAL

The Everybody's Irish party went well despite the cold because we had a warm tent. All the leftovers were donated to the Bethesda Cares luncheon program for the homeless. The Easter Egg Hunt also went well, thanks to the help of Ellie Nader who got a group of children to help "hide" the eggs and to Mark DeLaquil who made an excellent Easter bunny.

The Annual Meeting will be May 8. Food Truck Night is all set up and slated for May 11 from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. The Annual House Tour is May 20 (see story this issue). June 9 is the date for the Wine Tasting Event and the Council agreed to ask for volunteer hosts in the May newsletter. The Welcome New Neighbors' BBQ is slated for July 12.

The meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.



LIGHTING NEWS

With the plans from 2010 by our lighting designer in hand, Buildings and Roads Representative Carolyn Greis and Village Manager Andy Leon Harney have surveyed the proposed locations of lights in the master plan and based on spacing (see *News & Views* February 2018) we have added an additional five lights to be certain there are no dead spaces. We are in discussions with the major

supplier of municipal lighting, Acuity Brands, about getting a "warm white" LED demonstration light and they are going to provide us with a GIS survey version of our plan with attention to any "dead spots" we may have missed. Because we are using lighting that is attached to PEPCO poles, we are limited as to where we can put lights in some locations. Pink ribbons are on all the poles that will have lights on them under the new plan. The poles on Connecticut Avenue were not marked as we plan to use the same lighting pattern as now exists, only with new fixtures.

Did you know that the Montgomery County Police force has



VOTER REGISTRATION

Unlike most jurisdictions, if you live in Section 3, we want you to vote in our elections—even if you're not a U.S. citizen. Our only requirement is that you be 18 years of age and own or rent in Section 3. Those who have registered with us in prior years do not have to re-register. If you are listed in the Section 3 directory, you don't need to show us proof that you're a resident. If you're not listed in the directory, we will need a copy of a driver's license with your Section 3 address or a bill proving that you are indeed a resident.


